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BUSYNESS

"I am just too busy."

"I simply cannot do one more thing."

"I feel like all I do is push harder and harder until the moment I go to bed (and even then I'm staying up far later than I'd like)."

Does this sound familiar? I've heard these types of things from people all of my pastoral life.

I was with a group of people and one of them said that they wished they had been able to spend more time with a family member who was not doing well. The family member was sick and likely going to die soon. The problem was that there was work to be done and just not enough time.

Another person told me that they felt totally alone, isolated from the people they knew. Their friends were all so busy with life, work, kids, and sports that they just never had time anymore. I don't remember how this one ended.

Isn't that just sad, though? A loved one was not well, a friend isolated, yet work took a priority over seeing this person and spending time together.

These are not isolated incidents, and it is certainly not the only times that I have had someone say these to me. It is actually a fairly common occurrence. The issue is not that there was work to be done or that this person had an obligation to fulfill that work. The issue was not that the friends were caught up in life. No, the issue is that, whether or not we want to admit it, we tend to prioritize things (work, money, etc) over people.

Frequently we say that there "isn't time" to do the things that we say we want to do. However, there really is time, we just have to decide how to spend it. One time I asked a mentor how he could take time to do a certain thing and he told me, "Brock, I never take time for anything, I carve time for everything." He went on to say that he didn't have any more time than I had, so when there was something that he wanted to or needed to do, he took time from other things in order to make it happen.

This was a very content, happy man, and one of the things that he told me he always carved time for was his family (spouse, children, parents, siblings, etc). He carved that time from his leisure time. He carved that time from his "leave me alone" time. He carved that time from his work. He carved time from what the world calls success.

Not everyone works obsessively; maybe I'm the only one (though I know I'm not). Maybe you're on salary trying to make sure that you don't look bad. Maybe you're trying to put in extra time to get promoted. I don't know what it is for you, but, if you look at your life and say that you don't have time for your family or close friends if and when they need you, then maybe you should look into what you're using your time on and ask if you should carve some of that away.

As believers, we are called to carve time (and money) from our lives for the work of Christ. This, by the way, does not only happen when you lead a class or join a board; in fact, those can at times be less effective ministry than simply spending time with individuals. We are also called to carve time for our family. Regardless of your job, it cannot usurp all of your time from your spouse and kids. You need to pour time into those relationships on a consistent basis.

There will be periods of your life where you have to work extremely hard, long hours; just make sure that those seasons don't somehow become your modus operandi. If you make people your priority, you'll usually find that it gives you deeper purpose to life. For it is people, not work, that are created Imago Dei (in the Image of God).

GOD AND A ROCK

Recently someone brought up the age-old question: Can God create a rock so big He cannot lift (i.e. "move") it? There are two problems with this question: one is theological, the other is philosophical. Let's address the philosophical one first.

There are certain basic laws that apply both to our thoughts as well as to the real world. For example, the law of identity simply means that a "thing is what it is." That's it. If you're talking about apples, talking about apples. If oranges, then oranges. Simple as that. You could formulate this law into something that looks like A = A, and you can substitute whatever you want to for "A" (like apples, oranges, cats, dogs, etc.) and know that the thing you're talking about is equal to itself. Pretty straightforward, right?

Then there's the law of excluded middle. This essentially means that you're either talking about a thing (like apples) or you're not. If you were to formulate this law, it would look like: either A or non-A. Continuing our fruity example, it would say we're either talking about apples or non-apples. ("Non-apples" could be oranges, grapefruit, giraffes. In fact, it could mean anything except apples!) In other words, there is no middle ground-it is "excluded." You're either talking about a thing (whatever it is) or you're not. That's it.

Finally there's the law of non-contradiction. This law states a

thing cannot both be and not-be at the same time and in the same sense. What in the world does that mean? (It's easier than you think.) Take me as an example. Right now I'm sitting at a desk. What the law of noncontradiction says is that I cannot both be "sitting" and "not-sitting" at the same time and in the same sense. In fact. it's impossible that I'm both "sitting" and "not-sitting" simultaneously. So, if I'm sitting then I'm sitting (law of identity), I'm either sitting or not-sitting (law of excluded middle), but under no circumstances am I both sitting and not-sitting simultaneously and in the same sense because that would be a contradiction. Clear as mud so far?

What does all this have to do with God and a rock? Well....

Rocks are things that, by definition, have surfaces. The surface of a rock is what sets its boundaries. Insofar as a rock has boundaries, it's finite. That means, it has a limit. And God, who is infinite (unlimited) can, by definition, move a finite rock. (That much we generally agree on.)

But what about an "infinite rock"? Here's where people get themselves confused. We said above that a rock has a surface, and because it has a surface it's finite. Now a thing is either finite or it's not (law of excluded middle). But under no circumstances can it be both finite and not-finite (in other words, infinite). So what this question is asking is "Can God make a rock that's not a rock?" And that's a meaningless question. It's impossible-not just"impossible for man" but "impossible in itself." It cannot be thing. real As such, Omnipotence itself couldn't create it.

That brings me to my second point: the theological problem. Many of us have understood "omnipotence" to imply that God can do literally anything. Didn't Jesus himself say, "with God all things are possible?" (Mt. 19:26). Historically, however, the divine "omnipotence," attribute of which means all-powerful, has only been understood to mean that God can do anything that does not involve a contradiction. The reason for this is because contradictions (like "squarecircles") aren't things. Not only are they not things, but they cannot be things. And the fact that God cannot "create contradictions" is not repudiation to his omnipotence. but rather a deficiency in the As concept. the medieval theologian Thomas **Aguinas** pointed out, "Whatever implies a contradiction cannot (exist)...because no intellect [including God's] can possibly conceive such a thing." Again, this fact owes itself not to a limit in God, but a limit in the thing conceived. It's an impossible idea.

So, next time someone asks you if God can create a rock so big that He cannot lift it, make sure you ask them how big the rock is. Is it a finite rock? Sure, God can lift it. There is no finite rock that God cannot lift. He can lift all finite rocks. What about an "infinite rock?" In other words, "what about a rock that's not a rock." No, He cannot lift it. He cannot even make it. Because there is no "it." There's no rock that's not a rock (law of noncontradiction). It's either a rock or not a rock (law of excluded middle). And if it's a rock, then it's a rock (law of identity). And make sure to let them know that any more questions headed this way are therefore rock-headed.




UPBC MEN'S DINNER
